



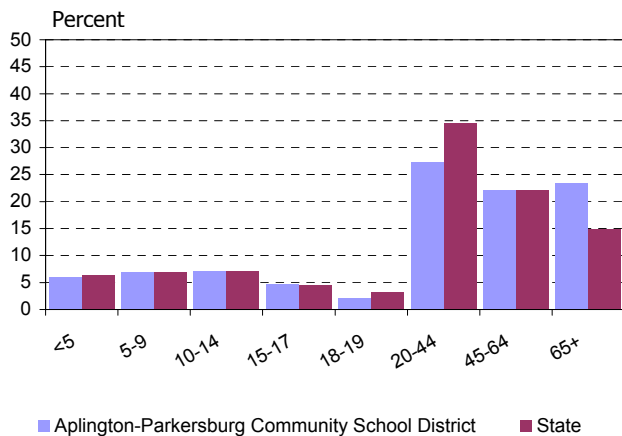
Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District Profile

Population Profile

AGE

Of the 2,038 persons in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District, 6 percent were under the age of 5 in 2000, 19 percent were 5 to 17 years of age, 27 percent were 20 to 44, and 23 percent were 65 years or older. The percentages statewide were 6, 19, 35, and 15, respectively (Figure 1).

Figure 1. Population by Selected Age Groups, 2000

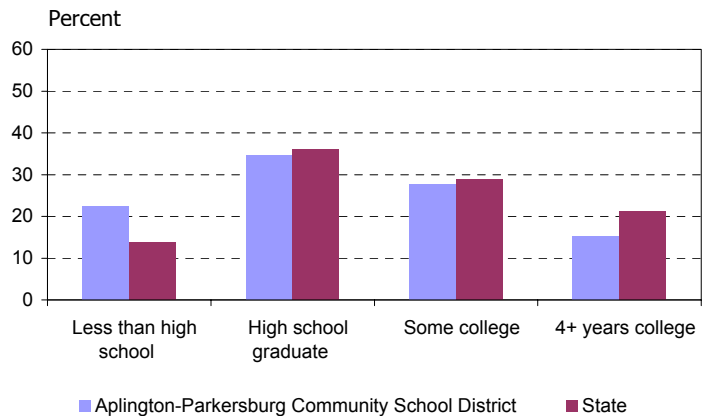

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Educational levels of an adult population are measured by the educational attainment of residents after their education is largely complete (25 years of age or older). In 2000, 43 percent of adults in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District had at least some post-secondary education compared to 50 percent statewide (Figure 2).

RACE AND HISPANIC ORIGIN

Whites accounted for 99 percent of the population in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District in 2000, compared to 94 percent statewide (Table 1). NOTE: the census bureau defines Hispanics as an ethnicity not as a race.

RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION

Members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church accounted for one-third of the religious adherents in Butler County in 2000. The Reformed Church in America and the United Methodist Church were the only other affiliations to account for more than 10 percent of the county's adherents. According to the Glenmary Research Center, religious adherents include all members of a church including full members, their children and the estimated number of other participants not considered members.

Employment Profile

Of the district's 450 workers 16 years or older with children in 2000, 29 percent were in the educational, health and social service sector and 14 percent were in the retail trade sector. In terms of occupations, 36 percent were in management, professional, and related occupations while 23 percent were in sales/office occupations.

With regards to commuting time and work schedules, 29 percent of the workers with children had a travel time to work of less than 10 minutes. Another 24 percent traveled 10 to 19 minutes, and 11 percent had a 20 to 29 minute commute to work. At least 68 percent of the workers left for work between the hours of 5:00 and 7:59 am, 4 percent left between 4:00 and 11:59 pm.

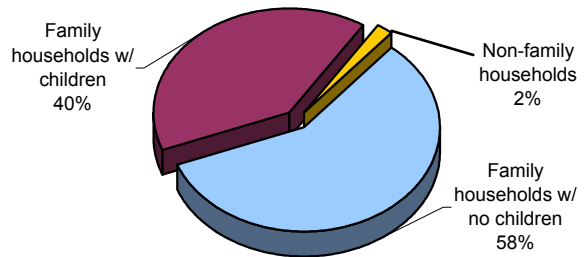
Household & Family Profile

HOUSEHOLD TYPE

There were 621 households in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District in 2000. The vast majority were family households meaning they had 2 or more persons related by blood, marriage or adoption. The remaining were non-family households made up of single persons or 2 or more non-related persons. Among all households, 40 percent had children under the age of 18 present* (Figure 3).

Figure 3. Percent of Households by Type, 2000

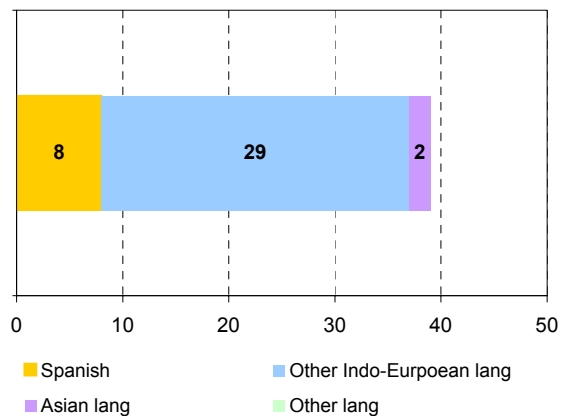

LINGUISTIC ISOLATION

A total of 39 households in Butler County were defined as linguistically isolated in 2000 (Figure 4). A linguistically isolated household is a household in which all members 14 years or older speak a non-English language and also have difficulty with English.

Living Arrangement of Children Profile

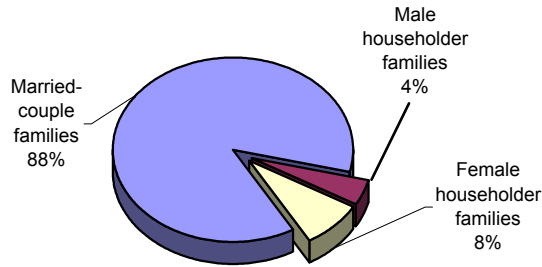
FAMILY TYPE

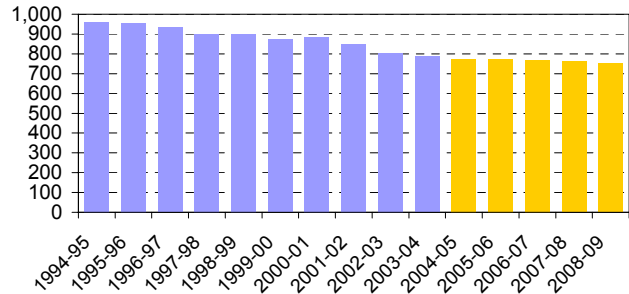


Figure 5. Children by Family Type, 2000

While the majority of the 491 children under 18 years of age* in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District in 2000 resided in a two-parent family, 63 (13 percent) lived in a family headed by a single parent (Figure 5).

EMPLOYMENT STATUS OF PARENTS

In Butler County, 73 percent of children under 6 living in a family or subfamily (7 of every 10) had all parents in the labor force compared to 71 percent statewide. All parents includes both parents in married-couple families, and the parent in male- or female-headed family households (Table 2).

ENROLLMENT AND PROJECTED ENROLLMENT

According to the Department of Education (BEDS), enrollment in the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District is projected to decrease by 4.5 percent between the 2003/04 and 2008/09 school year (Figure 6). Projected enrollment for the 2008-2009 school year is 751.

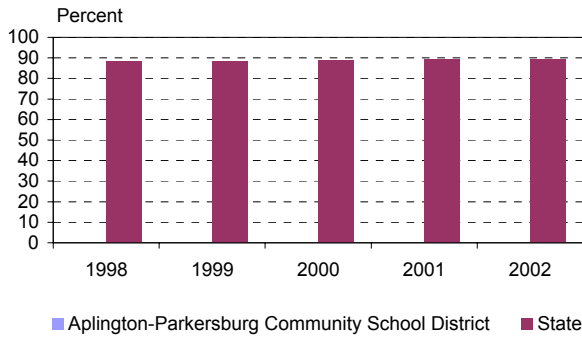
HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATE

Figure 7. High School Graduation Rates

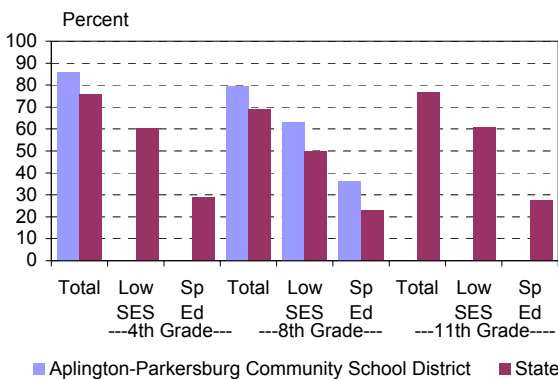

Figure 8. Percent Student Proficient—Reading

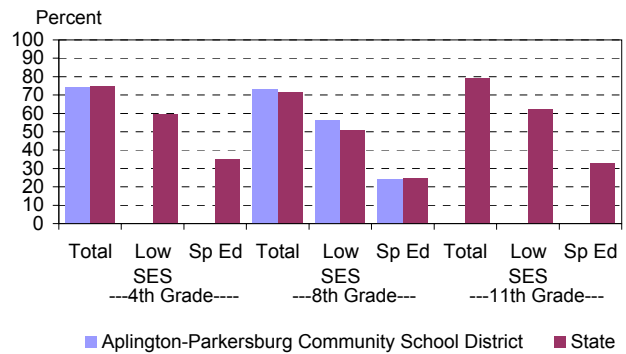

Figure 9. Percent Student Proficient—Math

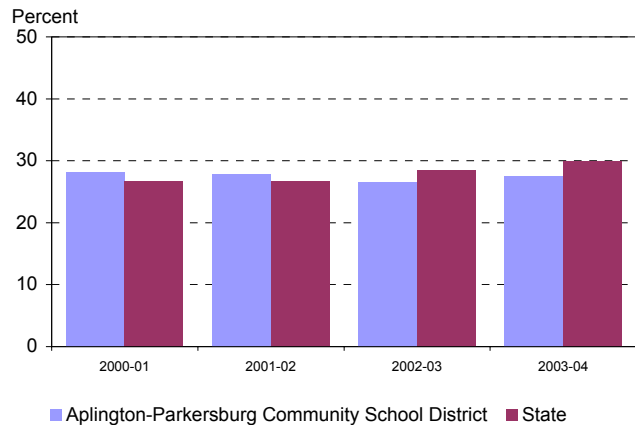

FREE AND REDUCED-PRICE SCHOOL MEALS

In the Aplington-Parkersburg Community School District, 28 percent of the K-12 students in 2003-2004 school year were eligible for free or reduced-price school meals compared to 30 percent statewide (Figure 10).
